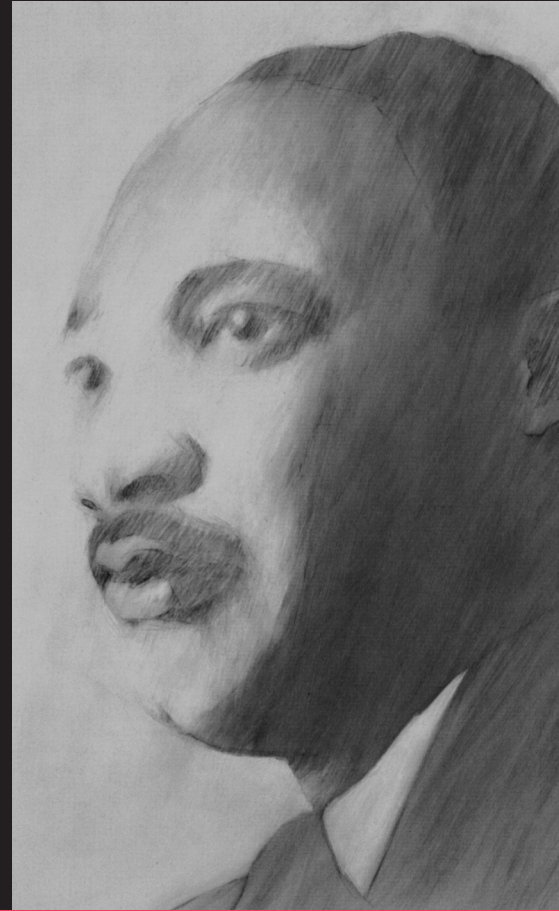

KINGIAN NONVIOLENCE EDUCATORS

Richard Tarlaian is a Senior Nonviolence Trainer, from the Center for Nonviolence and Peace Studies at the University of Rhode Island. Mr. Tarlaian retired Police Captain from the Providence Police Department. He is a US Army veteran. He currently serves as Adjunct Faculty at the Community College of Rhode Island. Mr. Tarlaian has traveled extensively over the past ten years, leading Nonviolence trainings in England, Nigeria, and South Africa, with Dr. Bernard LaFayette, former strategist for Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Jonathan L. Lewis has worked as a Kingian Nonviolence educator for over ten years under the tutelage of Dr. Bernard LaFayette Jr. As a Senior Kingian Nonviolence Trainer, Mr. Lewis has introduced Kingian Nonviolence in high school, middle school, male/female correctional facilities in Rhode Island and abroad. He has trained community organizers, "at-risk" and "gang" youth, educators, students of all ages, professors, community leaders, clergy, and correctional officers. Mr. Lewis now serves as the National Director of Nonviolence Direct Action Training for The Gathering for Justice, a Tides Center project inspired by Harry Belafonte. He has led trainings in over sixteen US states and in numerous countries internationally. In 2008, he exposed over 1,500 community leaders to the Kingian Nonviolence philosophy in the U.S. Mr. Lewis was recently selected to serve as one of the three National staff members for the Gathering for Justice.

Victoria Christgau — Founder/Director of the emerging CT Center for Nonviolence, A Martin Luther King, Jr. Institute. Certified as a LEVEL III Kingian Nonviolence trainer by Dr. Bernard LaFayette, Jr. from the University of Rhode Island's Center for Nonviolence and Peace Studies. Working as a Peace/Arts Educator for over 25 years, she uses music as a path towards peace, conducting workshops, performances and nonviolence trainings for people of all ages across the county. Some venues include: The United Nations, Trinity College, University of Connecticut, at The University of Rhode Island, HOT School Summer Institute, CEA Leadership Conference and others.
